

History-Landfill

- Begin as a private property dump site in the late 1950's.
- Established as a county owned landfill in 1975 by use of donated property. (John W. Bowman 67.8 acres)
- Additional 100 acres donated IMCO in 1988
- Highway Department operated landfill from 1975-1994
- Landfill operated by Santek from 1994 to 1997



History-Landfill

- By resolution the Solid Waste Authority was created in 1994
 - Members of the Solid Waste Authority: Chairman
 E.B. Pemberton, Eddie Owings (Secretary), Tom
 Hamby, Sam Davis, Tim Neal, Bob Thomas, John
 Thompson, W.F. Ferguson, L.P. Malmquist
- Landfill closed on September 30, 1997
- J. Hicks Construction contracted by Roane County to do post closure work.

Solid Waste at Landfill Site

- Plant operations (Midtown) include:
 - Equipment
 - Scale and scale house
 - 2 Compactors
 - (1) 5 yard large item compactor
 - (1) 2 yard household trash compactor
 - 3 Mack roll-off trucks (2007, 2006 & 1997)
 - 1 GMC front load garbage truck (1994)
 - 1 GMC ¾ ton dually 4x4 (1999)
 - 1 Chevrolet 1/2 ton pick-up truck (2003)
 - (4) 40 yard roll-off containers
 - Bobcat skid steer loader
 - Personnel
 - 4 full-time and 2 part-time






Convenience Centers

- First offsite disposal commonly known as a "Green Box" site was at the entrance of Roane County Park.
- First convenience centers opened in mideighties based on TVA study approximately seven (7) initial sites.

Convenience Centers

There are currently
 14 convenience
 centers (the map does not include the landfill site).

• TVA Revenue Sharing- 415,000

Total Revenue- \$1,131,000

Convenience Centers- \$1,042,000

Total Appropriations- \$1,161,000

Convenience Center

 Collection tonnage: Approximately 30 tons of household garbage collected each week from convenience centers.



- Operational hours: Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday from 7:30 am to 5:30 pm
- Operators: 2 Full-time, 24 Part-time (does not include landfill site) with 1 full-time foreman/maintenance employee for all centers



Convenience Center



"Going Green"

- Solar powered garbage compactor at Orchard View (pilot program)
- Waste oil used for heating at the Midtown Recycling Center
- Supply waste oil for heating to the Highway Department and Animal Shelter.



Recycling Fund 123

- 2 cent county wide property tax- \$260,000
- Collection charges- \$127,000
- Sale of Recyclables- \$207,000
- Grants- \$39,000
- Total Revenue- \$670,000
- Recycling Center- \$602,000
- Post-closure Care- \$76,000
- Total Appropriation- \$678,000

Recycle Program

- Recycle Program established in 1998.
- The reason for recycle program: environmental issue, regulatory requirements, reduce cost per ton, recover cost of recycle material and reduce amount of waste in landfill
- Recycling began with:
 - cardboard
 - paper
 - aluminum



Recycle Program

Current recycled items are:

Cardboard: 20 tons per week

Paper: 20 tons bi-monthly

Aluminum: 1 ton every 3 months

– Steel:

- Electronics
- Batteries
- Oil
- Paint
- Plastic #1 and #2
- Antifreeze
- Tires



Recycle Program

- Plant operations include:
 - Equipment
 - General purpose bailer (cardboard, paper and plastic)
 - Aluminum bailer
 - Separating equipment
 - Specialty vehicles
 - Containers
 - Oil filter crusher
 - Personnel
 - Michael Dunn work program low cost
 - Community service program no cost
 - 2 full-time and 1 part-time county employees

Future Opportunities

- Updated facility for packaging/shipping cardboard
- Contract with county schools for recycling of cardboard, plastic and paper
- Continue to upgrade from front load boxes at convenience centers to compactors
- Additional solar energy compactors
- Converting methane gas from landfill to energy efficient use
- Wood chip production for bio-reactor fuel

Land Use Opportunities

- Future land fill operations (asset on hold)
- E.O.D. detonation range for known or suspected explosives found in Roane County. (Resolution)
- Roane County Sheriff's Department firing range. (Resolution)
- Expanding recycle production (Capital Budget)
- Central locations for building sites, warehousing emergency response operations and response vehicles. (Capital Budget)
- Recreational use (Resolution)
